When Jesus walked on the earth, his mercy and compassion were front and center for all to see. In the Gospel of Mark, a man suffering with leprosy approached Him for healing. In Biblical times, leprosy was a disease that made people back away and shun those who were afflicted for fear of contagion. But Jesus did not back away, he moved toward the man and then did the unthinkable – he touched him!

And a man with leprosy came to Jesus, imploring Him and kneeling down, and saying to Him, “If You are willing, You can make me clean.” Moved with compassion, Jesus reached out with His hand and touched him, and said to him, “I am willing; be cleansed.” And immediately the leprosy left him, and he was cleansed. (Mark 1:40-42)

Determined to follow the example of Jesus in displaying mercy and compassion to others, Hidden with Christ Ministries began its REHEMA PROJECTS in Tanzania. (Rehema is the Swahili word for MERCY)



Our projects vary, from the simple to the complex, depending upon the needs that God brings to us. In the photo to the left, you see a man with a terminal illness, who lives with his brother. The Social Welfare office in Moshi became aware of their desperate need for food this past month and contacted our office for help. The ill man cannot work, and his brother works occasional day labor jobs when they are available. They had not eaten for several days when our office staff went to visit and verify the situation, bringing them a gift of food that would last several weeks.

People suffering hardships exist all around us in Tanzania, and as the Lord sends supplies, we give out to those in need. 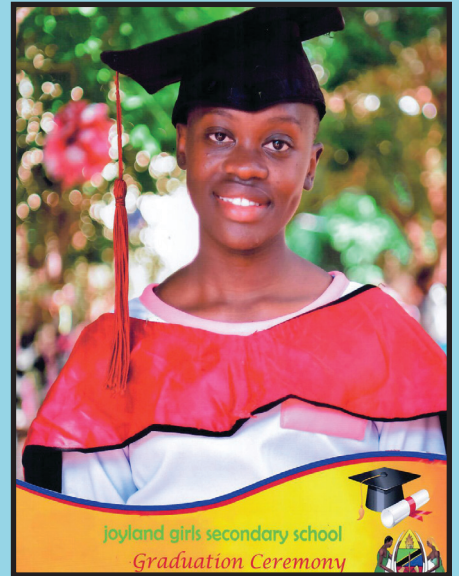


FAITHFUL



There are four confrontational episodes between Jesus and the Jewish religious leaders described in the twelfth chapter of the Gospel of Mark. We get a more complete picture of what is going on when we examine the full chapter (*Mark 12: 1-34*)

In the first twelve verses, Jesus told the parable of the vineyard to the chief priests, elders, and teachers of the law. Who were these people? The chief priests ran the religious show and always had the last word about temple business. The Elders were their board of directors. The teachers of the law were those who studied the law carefully for every crossed “t” and dotted “i” in an attempt to discover the truth.

After Jesus told the parable of the vineyard pointing out that all the servants of the vineyard owner were killed by the tenant farmers, including the son, they suddenly realized he was talking about them. Furious at Jesus for portraying them as the wicked tenant farmers, they wanted to kill him. Did they realize he was “the Son” described in the parable? They could not seem to recognize there was an authority greater than them.

The second inquiry came from the Pharisees and Herodians. Their question was posed to support their personal beliefs. The Pharisees were Jews who were anti-Roman government. The Herodians were Jews supporting Herod, who stood in agreement with the local Roman government. Imagine, these two opposing groups posing the same question to Jesus. Their intention was to force Jesus to take sides on the issue of paying taxes.

Should they pay taxes to Caesar or only to God? The famous reply, “Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God,” was Jesus’ profound answer. He didn’t say, “Don’t pay taxes,” neither did he say, “Pay only the temple tax.” Because of His wisdom, neither faction got the answer they wanted, but they did come to realize they could not trick him.

The third inquiry was from the Sadducees. They did not believe in the resurrection, so they posed a question concerning marriage after death. Of course, the question was a convoluted attempt to get Jesus to say there is no resurrection. But Jesus corrected their theology by saying, “God is the God of the living” and thereby pointing out that their whole concept was in error.

The fourth inquiry was from a teacher of the law. This fellow knew the law inside-out. He asked, “Which is the greatest commandment?” Jesus quoted the law as it stands. **“You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.”** He did not give an interpretation by saying, “It depends,” or “Look at the circumstances,” or any such law-bending compromise. When the teacher of the law agreed with Jesus, the Lord told him he was not far from the Kingdom. The Kingdom of God is solid, immovable, and established in His Word. Don’t ever doubt it.

What kinds of questions do you ask Jesus? Do you want your authority established? Do you want Him to take sides? Do you want your belief to be justified? Will you stand on the Word of God?

Just as these people tested Jesus, you must test your motive for asking. Are you ready for His answers?

After two full years of going to school in America, I can say that it has been a lot of fun. I have learned so much. But the most amazing thing is that I have received five Honor Roll certificates from the principal for having straight A's. I am thankful to God for helping me and bringing me to the U.S.A.

I am also thankful to all the people who have donated money to help me and all the Treasures of Africa KIDZ attend good schools. I hope each one of you is very blessed this year.

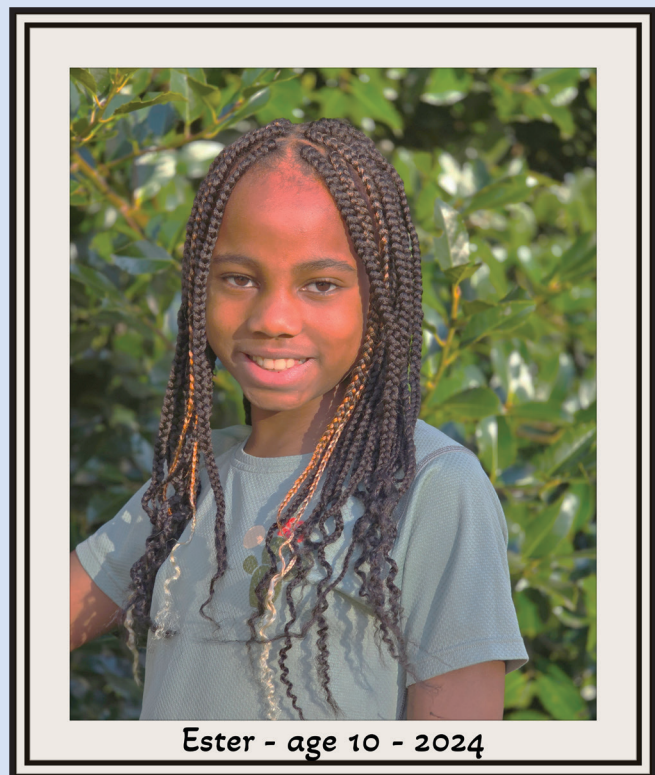

Ester came to live at Treasures of Africa Children's Home in Moshi, Tanzania when she was 3 years old. (see photo on page 7) Her family was unknown to the authorities. It quickly became apparent that this little girl was very bright. Observing her potential, it was decided that efforts should be made to give Ester the opportunity to receive her education in the U.S.A. After a lengthy and hard-fought process, (and a multitude of prayers!) permission from the Tanzanian government was granted and she was awarded a passport for the sole purpose of travel outside the country for education. Then the U.S. Embassy in Tanzania granted the necessary student visa and Ester was allowed to come to the United States as an international student. She traveled to the U.S. with two of her Treasures of Africa "siblings"- Jesca (aged 12 at the time) and Raymond, who was scheduled to begin studies at Liberty University School of Aeronautics. Hidden With Christ Ministries continues to pay for Ester's education at Liberty Christian Academy in Lynchburg, Virginia through the generosity of donors to our TOA KIDZ Education Fund. We believe that this investment in Ester's life is critical to seeing God's purpose fulfilled in her life.

A Few Little-Known Facts about Boarding School in Tanzania

When you mention “boarding school” to someone in the USA, that phrase usually conjures up one of two images. The first is a place for the wealthy to send their children for a customized education featuring luxurious accommodations and high-end recreational activities from horseback riding to ice skating. The second image might be that of a residential school for students with behavior problems whose parents can afford the steep costs associated with in-patient psychological care. Neither of these images characterize what “boarding school” means in Tanzania.

In Tanzania, boarding school is very common and not the exclusive province of the rich. In fact, most students who have graduated from Secondary School in Tanzania have attended at least a few years of boarding school. The main reason is that there are not enough schools in the country’s population centers to hold all the children of school age. So, parents are forced to send their children to boarding schools

outside the area where they live because there is no “neighborhood school” as is common in America. So even young children of Primary School age are sent to boarding schools, especially if they live in rural areas where no schools have been built.

Most of the sponsored Treasures of Africa KIDZ who are at the Secondary School level are in a boarding school. (We try very hard to avoid sending Primary School aged students into a boarding school setting, though we currently have 3 students in 7th grade in boarding school.) These schools are all private schools, but they are a far cry from the fancy boarding schools catering to the wealthy. They are simply designed, with very basic dormitory style accommodations.

Boarding school students are required to bring a long list of required items to school each semester including all their own bedding materials down to their own mattress! They must arrive at school with cleaning supplies (bring your own broom!) and carry a personal supply of toilet paper and laundry soap to school. They are required to bring a footlocker to keep their own supplies separate from other students and to guard against theft.

Every student must also contribute several reams of paper to the school each semester. None of these items are supplied by the school. So, the outlay of money to buy all the required items for each boarding school student each semester is quite high. In addition to school fees, school uniforms, books, school supplies, food and transportation expenses, these items listed above (and more) are purchased each semester through the Treasures of Africa KIDZ Education Fund.

In light of this information, perhaps you can understand why so many people in Tanzania never attend school beyond the Primary level. (The median education level in Tanzania is 6th grade.) The average Tanzanian family cannot afford to purchase even a portion of the required list of items a Secondary School student must bring with them to boarding school, let alone pay the school fees! So many are struggling just to provide the day-to-day basic needs of food, shelter and clothing for their families.

This is why Hidden with Christ Ministries is so committed to invest in the education of orphaned and vulnerable children in Tanzania. We know that without outside help, these children would be forced to drop out of school and would end up doing menial labor at a very young age.

We are so grateful to all our partners who have joined with us to support the education of the TOA KIDZ. We are seeing good fruit from the many years of investment in these precious children! Thank you for your continued support!

OVERCOMING



A TESTIMONY

I sought the Lord and He heard me and delivered me from all my fears.

Psalm 34:4

Strong's Exhaustive Bible Concordance tells us that the English word "fear" comes from the Greek word "phobeo" which means "panic which grips a person, causing him to either run away in fright or to be paralyzed and unable to move; to be alarmed, scared, frightened, dismayed, intimidated, anxious or apprehensive." From "phobeo" we get the English word "phobia" which means, "an irrational, excessive and persistent fear of something, someone, or some situation."

Just like everyone else, fear has come to me in various forms for most of my life. There's been fear of the dark, fear of the unknown, fear of bodily harm and illness, fear of failing in school or of losing a job, fear of the dentist, fear of poverty, fear of punishment when I erred, fear of public speaking, fear that my best wouldn't be good enough. I've experienced all of the above and others besides. I don't know your list of fears, but everyone has their own "Achilles heel" of fear. Mine caused a real paralysis in my life.

For me, fear was like living under a thick, damp blanket which threatened to smother me. I was unable to remove it, and it drowned out my cries for help. It was like being in a prison from which there was no escape, but where one yearns for freedom. I had no power to overcome fear.

Then one day I read Revelation 21:8, which describes a list of people who would be thrown into the lake of fire. I was shocked to read that the first group of people in that list were "the fearful." That caused more fear, until I learned that other translations interpret it as "cowardliness in following Christ." Then I read Revelation 3:21, "***To him who overcomes I will grant to sit with Me on My throne, for I also overcame.***" It gave me hope that I could possibly be an overcomer too.

But it seemed the more I tried to conquer fear, the more it attacked me. So, I took a concordance and looked up every single "fear not" listed in the Bible. I began seeking every scripture I could find to help with this battle against fear. In reading Ephesians 6, which tells us to be "***strong in the Lord and in the power of His might,***" verse 16 stood out to me. It says, "***and above all, lift up the shield of faith whereby we can quench all of the fiery darts of the enemy.***"

Suddenly I understood that the enemy had been shooting fiery darts of fear at me all my life! He had robbed me of faith and trust in the Lord, and was keeping me in the bondage of fear, causing me to miss out on the best God had for me. I was getting excited at what I was learning, then I discovered Psalm 28:7 backed up Ephesians' shield of faith with King David's words, "***The Lord is my strength and my shield, my heart trusts in Him and I am helped.***"

I searched for other encouraging, faith-building words in the Bible and found they began to chop away at the deeply ingrained roots of fear in my life.

We have a choice in our lives. We can trust and obey God's Word, or fall victim to the enemy of our soul, allowing him to shoot his fiery darts at us. But it is best to stand up to the devil, call him the liar that he is, and run to the Lord. We can ask Him to help us to be overcomers of all that is contrary to His Word. And God will answer that prayer!

Let me share the following story about the day God had me face my fears head on.

I'd returned home from a week of vacation to hear my neighbor tell of seeing two men jump the fence behind my house and try to break the window in my back door. He called 911. The police came quickly, and they ran off. The police told me to cut down a large rhododendron bush behind which they could have hidden, if the neighbor hadn't seen them come over the fence. Because there was a screen behind the window, they couldn't easily break the glass to reach in and open the door. I cut down the bush and put screening on three other windows. I dealt with an unsettled and wary feeling, which in time wore off.

Then I left town for another week and came home to find a police car in front of my house. It seems the thieves had returned for another attempt to break in. Again, the neighbor saw them and called 911. Thank God for alert neighbors! The men ran off. But this time, fear came in like a flood.

As I was about to go to bed, I turned on every light in the house, and just lay on my bed fully clothed, even wearing my coat and shoes. I barely slept and heard every sound. This became my routine for over a week. Then one night as I reached out to turn on a lamp, I heard the voice of the Lord say, "Will that light protect you?" It was so unexpected that I just stood there with my hand on the switch, waiting to hear further words. I was so surprised that He would speak to me about the situation. Then I quickly realized that was all He intended to say. As I repeated His words to myself, I answered, "No, Lord, but You will." I admit it took every ounce of courage that I could muster up to turn off all the lights, undress, put pajamas on and get into bed.

But once I took those steps of faith, fear left, and peace filled me. I prayed some of the scriptures I had previously discovered. Then I had the best sleep I'd experienced in weeks. God had given me the breakthrough.

My prayer is that this testimony will encourage you to trust in God and His word and allow Him to totally deliver you from all your fears. May you experience God's peace and hope.

Some of the Scriptures which have helped me are:

Do not be afraid, I am your shield, your exceeding great reward. Genesis 15:1

Do not be afraid. Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord. Exodus 14:13

Do not let your heart faint; do not be afraid, and do not tremble or be terrified because of them, for the Lord your God is He Who goes with you. Deut. 20:3

The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life, of whom shall I be afraid? Psalm 27:1

I sought the Lord and He heard me and delivered me from all my fears. The Angel of the Lord encamps all around those who fear Him and delivers them. Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord delivers him out of them all. Psalm 34:4,7,19

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear... Psalm 46:1-2

Fear not, there is nothing to fear for I am with you. Do not look around you in terror nor be dismayed for I am your God. I will strengthen you and will harden you to difficulties. Yes, I will help you, yes, I will hold you and retain you by My victorious right hand of righteousness. Isaiah 41:10

STAND, SIT, SAY AND PRAY

Four Ways to Help Someone in Crisis

A stranger sat in a hospital room at the bedside of a teenager he did not know. He had found him on the ground bleeding from a stab wound in an alley behind a raucous nightclub in South Africa. The man placed him in the backseat of his car and drove him to the hospital. For many days, he sat by his side, as the young man slowly came out of the fog of a drug induced haze. When the teen was conscious, his story came out.

He was a musician who had performed at that nightclub. While pushing his way through the noisy crowd, he was stabbed by an unknown assailant. No one seemed to notice him as he stumbled along bleeding. Between the drugs in his system and the loss of blood, he collapsed in the alley while trying to find help. Had the stranger not intervened, his crisis would have resulted in death. But the stranger did not stop there. He spoke to the young man of God's love and purpose for his life. He led him in a prayer to surrender his life to the Lord and gave him counsel as to how to begin a new life in Christ. When he was discharged from the hospital, the stranger drove him home. The young man, whose name was Kim Clement, never saw that stranger again. Yet his intervention in Kim's crisis changed his life forever. Kim became a minister who touched the lives of many around the world.

It is highly probable that you know one or more people facing a personal crisis right now. Perhaps you have wanted to help them but didn't know what to say or feared you might say the "wrong thing." And yet your intervention may be the key to changing their life.

The Bible gives us some very good counsel on how to help people in a crisis. In the book of Exodus, we find a story about Moses and the children of Israel from which we can glean some wisdom to help others who are facing a time of great stress in their lives.

In this passage of scripture, the Israelites were headed to the Promised Land, after having just escaped the bondage of slavery in Egypt. Suddenly, they found themselves confronted by an enemy army of Amalekites who were ready to attack. As their leader, Moses was under extreme pressure to save the ragtag group of former slaves from what looked like certain disaster.

Then Amalek came and fought against Israel at Rephidim. So, Moses said to Joshua, "Choose men for us and go out, fight against Amalek. Tomorrow, I will station myself on the top of the hill with the staff of God in my hand." Joshua did just as Moses told him, and fought against Amalek; and Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. So, it came about, when Moses held his hand up, that Israel prevailed; but when he let his hand down, Amalek prevailed. And Moses' hands were heavy. So, they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat on it; and Aaron and Hur supported his hands, one on one side and one on the other. So, his hands were steady until the sun set. And Joshua defeated Amalek... Exodus 17:8-13 (NASB)

STAND

Aaron and Hur walked with Moses up the hill and **STOOD WITH MOSES**. They were physically present for Moses. The scripture does not say they said a single word to him – they just stood with him on that hill. Many people avoid others who are going through difficult times because they feel inadequate to give them counsel. You can stand with people in their crisis even if you do not know what to say – just be physically present! That alone brings comfort and shows love and compassion.

While Aaron and Hur stood with Moses – they were able to observe what he needed. Their first observation was that Moses needed to sit down – he was tired. So, they found a stone and put it under him. They provided a rock chair so that he could save his strength. It was a simple thing but so very helpful! We need to be willing to stand with people in their distress, even if we cannot imagine how we can help. Practical needs will become apparent if you just show up.

Aaron and Hur were also able to observe that Moses needed someone to hold up his arms because he was becoming exhausted. The scriptures tell us that while Moses' hands were held high – Joshua and the Israelite army prevailed. But when Moses put his hands down, the enemy prevailed. So, they stepped up and provided that very simple act of physically holding up Moses' arms. **Aaron and Hur supported his hands, one on one side and one on the other. So, his hands were steady until the sun set. And Joshua defeated Amalek....** That one small intervention by Aaron and Hur changed the direction of the battle and helped bring the victory!

You will never know the power of the practical help you can provide to a person going through a difficult season unless you stand with them, observe the needs, and then serve!

SIT

Many of the crises of life involve grief over the loss of loved ones. If you are familiar with the Biblical book of Job, you may recall Job lost all his children in a single disastrous event – when a house collapsed on them during a fierce windstorm. Job's friends heard about his tremendous losses and came to visit him. Though later in the narrative, Job's friends said everything you should not say to a grieving person, they started out well and their example is worth noting. Job 2:13 reads, **“Then they sat on the ground with him for seven days and seven nights. No one said a word to him, because they saw how great his suffering was.”**

Just sitting with a hurting person speaks volumes and brings immeasurable comfort. No words are needed if you can just hold their hand or allow them to cry on your shoulder. God can use you to be His agent of comfort and you don't need words for this assignment!

SAY

However, there are times when words will help. You may not have a suggested list of “5 easy ways to win this battle” to give to your friend in crisis. But you can say what God says and know that you are on solid ground. Here is an exhortation to God's people found in the book of Isaiah:

Encourage the exhausted and strengthen the feeble. Say to those with anxious heart, “Take courage, fear not. Behold, your God will come with vengeance; The recompense of God will come, But He will save you.” Isaiah 35:3 (NASB 1995)

God's people are called to be those who can speak encouragement, faith, and hope for the future. The Bible is full of such words, and you can use scripture to encourage and comfort someone in crisis. Whether you speak words of encouragement face to face, through a letter, email, or text message, you can say what God says to your hurting friend. And those words will be meaningful.

PRAY

You may be far away from the friend or relative that is going through a crisis and yet you long to help. Don't allow yourself to say, “all I can do is pray,” as if that was a lesser level of assistance than those described above. Prayer is powerful and needed in EVERY crisis! The apostle Paul highly valued the prayers of others which were lifted to God for him. In fact, he exhorted the believers to pray for him when he was facing danger during his missionary journeys.

In First Thessalonians 5:25 he wrote, **“Brethren, PRAY FOR US!”**

Paul told the believers in the Corinthian church, **“... you are helping us by praying for us.”** (2 Cor 1:11a NLT)

Don't be ashamed to tell those in crisis that you are praying for them. Pray and believe like the apostle Paul that you are helping the person in need through your prayers.

God wants to use you to comfort and encourage those facing a crisis. You simply need to be willing to **STAND, SIT, SAY and PRAY!**
